The Importance of Social Investment

Like many of you, I was pleased to hear BC's new Premier announce that the disability assistance rate would be raised by \$100 in September. 2017. For many of the adults we support, this increase is long overdue. It is a challenge for many to make ends meet and this increase represents a better chance to find adequate housing or good nutrition. The \$100 is a start.

In his press release, Premier John Horgan spoke of the need support people to live in dignity, fur-

ther promising, "Raising the rates is only the beginning. Our government is committed to bring forward a comprehensive poverty reduction plan to lift children and families out of poverty". We will be watching closely and welcome strategies to support families.

MACL has almost 60 years of experience supporting families, children and adults who live with a disability. Over these decades, we have been repeatedly reminded of the ability of those with diverse abilities to flourish in communities with the right supports in place.

Having a family member with an intellectual disability can have an effect on the entire family, extended family and personal support network. It is a unique shared experience that can affect all aspects of family functioning.

From a positive perspective, it can result in deeper connections and relationships within the family

system, discovery of joy in unexpected places, rich appreciation of that which makes us unique, and the development of creativity and resilience.

On the other hand, the time constraints, financial burdens, physical and emotional demands and the struggle to meet their child's complex needs can place stress on the entire family and result in breakdown in the absence of effective support.



In Canada we live in a democratic country where everyone has the right to vote. We vote for who represents us in government and leads our country. It was not always this way. In 1982 the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms was passed giving everyone the right to vote in Canada but some populations were still excluded: judges, prisoners, and people with mental disabilities. Advocates rallied and a Royal Commission was asked to investigate. In 1992 recommendations were given. In 1993 Bill C114 was passed giving people with mental disabilities the right to vote. It also mandated education and information programs be provided for Canadians with special needs. Since then special considerations have been put into place to support those wishing to exercise their right to vote. You can ask for help with marking your ballot if you have a disability or difficulty reading or writing. Braille candidate lists, large print ballot posters, and plastic ballot templates for the visually impaired are available. All advance polling centers and many general voting places are wheelchair accessible. If you can't enter a polling center you can vote outside. Telephone voting is also in place for voters with vision loss or who have a disability that restricts their ability to vote independently.

There are many countries around the world where people do not have the right to vote and choose their leaders and representatives in government. Our ancestors fought and advocated to give us the privilege to vote so get educated and vote in our next election.




